### A Letter from Pastor John

Books are our friends, even the dusty ones. As children, someone was likely to have read to us at home. We had required reading in school and reading assignments to complete at home, as well. Public libraries were frequented for the shelves-upon-shelves of fascinating facts and ideas, things to learn about our natural surroundings and cultures all over the world. Then, advent of computers often displaced trips to the library, those brick and clapboard structures that struggled to stay alive in much the same way ordering things online became a hardship for brick-and-mortar stores. I'm a bit old-fashioned when it comes to books. I would much rather hold a book in my hand and be able to turn its pages. There is just something about them that brings back a lot of memories, and makes my reading enjoyable.

Church libraries endure hardships, too, so they are no different than town libraries. They suffer much more than their community equivalents, perhaps because the selection is so much smaller. One can rationalize, "Why go to a church library when Google holds a bottomless pit of information for casual reading or research, as often as needed and at any hour of the day?" 

The oldest Bible I discovered in the library was printed in Welsh, copyright 1867. (Handle carefully.) The library also has a copy of *The Story of the Bible*, copyright 1884. The library contains boxes of misc. arts and crafts, poster paper, and a few pieces of artwork on display on the very top shelf. There is no shortage of old hymnbooks. The oldest hymnbook on the shelf is dated 1907, a yellowed paperback book filled with fragile pages of old gospel hymns, two reproductions which I plan to use the next Communion Sunday, August 6.

Each book in the library has been, or will be, a treasure for someone to discover. Church libraries are a type of ministry, not unlike other church ministries of music and service. Ours is staffed by a devoted librarian who is more than willing to help you.


